


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




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Hike, bike of and paddle!

Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway is 75-miles of hiking trails linking the summits of Sunapee, Ragged and Kearsarge mountains and maintained by the SRKG Coalition. SRKG volunteer members lead hikes throughout the summer, plus there are other events offered. Maps, calendar of events and more can be found at www.srkg.com.

Mount Sunapee offers many trails including the ski trails, Summit Hiking Trail, Lake Solitude Hiking Trail and the Newbury Hiking Trail. There's also the Andrew Brook Trail (great for families) off Mountain Road which also will take you to Lake Solitude. Info: www.mountsunapee.com.

Mt. Kearsarge can be hiked from two sides. Rollins State Park in Warner has a nice family hike up the mountain. The Wilmot side is a more challenging hike from Winslow State Park.

For suggestions and trail maps, also visit the New London, Newbury or Sunapee information booths. Town halls are also a good source for maps and information compiled by the town's conservation commission.

Pillsbury State Park in Washington, off Rte. 31, is crossed by a network of hiking and mountain bike trails. These trails offer easy to moderate hiking in fairly remote settings. The park is an important link in the Monadnock-Sunapee Greenway, a 51-mile trail connecting Mt. Monadnock with Mt. Sunapee in the north.

Many towns and areas are getting involved in the Rails to Trails movement which turns the old railroad lines into well-maintained four-season recreational trails. These trails provide wonderful easy hiking and biking allowing anyone the opportunity to enjoy the scenic views and experience the natural beauty of the areas. Some allow horseback riding.

One such trail is the 58-mile Northern Recreation Rail Trail which runs from the Concord city line to Lebanon. There are many parking areas and trailheads along the route. Kearsarge-Sunapee area visitors can park at Potter Place at the intersection of Rtes. 4 and 11 in Andover or at the Highland Lake Inn trailhead in East Andover. The Danbury General Store also has trail access along with parking, bathrooms and food. For more information and to find maps and where to park, check www.nhstateparks.org and look under the Trails Bureau or visit www.fnrt.org.

Another rails-to-trail section is at Bagley Field in Warner. This rail line originally connected Concord to Claremont. Other towns along this route are working on completing their own sections to bring visitors through the Sunapee area.

The Blackwater River in Andover is highly recommended for kayaking. If you like loons try the Little Lake Sunapee and explore around Colby Point. Kezar Lake is another good bet for canoeing or kayaking. Your boat can be put in at the boat ramp next to Smiley Grove in North Sutton village. You can also take the 3-mile walk around the lake. If you're lucky, you can spot the nesting eagle. Lake Massasecum in Bradford has a public boat ramp off Rte. 114 with limited parking.



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NEW HAMPSHIRE IS GREAT OUTDOORS Beaches/Boating



There are beaches on every lake in this region. However, most towns restrict their use to town residents and their guests. Ask your host for a parking permit.

These beaches are open to the public:

Lake Massasecum Park and Campground, Bradford

Open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. to Labor Day. A long wide beach looks across the lake to the surrounding hills. Nonmotorized boat rentals available, snack bar and more than 30 picnic tables and fishing (with license.) No lifeguards on duty. No dogs. Massasecum Lake Road off Rte. 114. 938-2571. Admission fee.

Newbury Harbor Town Beach Lake Sunapee, Newbury

Rte. 103. Free. Open daily, 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Large swimming area with dock and a row of buoys. Handicap accessible restrooms. No lifeguard, two hour parking.

Mount Sunapee State Park Beach Lake Sunapee, Newbury

Open daily weather permitting mid-June to Labor Day, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Because of popularity, could sell out in morning. No glass bottles. Longest stretch of sand available to swimmers on 4,085-acre Lake Sunapee. Lifeguards on duty Wed.-Sun. Fishing, boating, swimming and picnicking. Store, canoe and kayak rentals, playground, new bathhouse and handicap accessible restrooms

with separate changing areas. Off Rte. 103 at the circle. Admission fee. Pets are not allowed on beach. Boat launch is very shallow and rocky, not recommended for outboard motors, best for car top boats.

Wadleigh State Park Kezar Lake, North Sutton

Located on Penacook Road off Rte. 114, 927-4724. Large parking lot, narrow long beach, large swimming area with sandy bottom roped off with buoys. No lifeguard on duty. No pets. Handicap accessible restrooms and separate changing areas, 30 picnic tables shade by tall pines, playground equipment and fishing. Admission fee.





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

Sunapee Graniteworks and Sunapee Rock Shop offer unique artisan's shop

BY NATASHA OSBORNE-HOWE

NEW LONDON – What simply seemed to be a resource for granite interestingly evolved into a multi-faceted venture and paved the way to the establishment of a unique artisan's shop.

Bill and Pam Stocker of Sunapee Graniteworks and Sunapee Rock Shop have worked with passionate diligence to build a rock-solid business, community connections and create distinctive products.

They raised three sons in Sunapee: Brandon, Jeremy and Brad. Brandon and Brad started working in the business as teenagers.

In August 2017 the Stockers opened the shop on Route 103B, a few doors from the quarry yard. It was a space and opportunity to accommodate the growing business. They had been selling their products from home, online

and at shops in New London and Newport.

"The shop is a blending of Sunapee Graniteworks and the American Bead Collection, but Sunapee Graniteworks is the mothership," said Pam. "Opening the store felt like a natural progression of our story."

"Through the years we have been rock hounds and rock lovers," said Pam. "Rocks bind us and there are just certain people who are drawn to earth."

The Stockers found the public warmly receptive and appreciative, a multitude of folks traveling from afar.

"We are pleasantly surprised by the volume of business," Pam said.

A walk through Sunapee Rock Shop is a visual feast and a mystical journey through natural wonders. Granite, rocks and minerals have been magically transformed into jewelry, coasters, stone oil lamps, trivets and much more.

"The stone lamps are much different than what you can find on the internet," Pam said. "The granite makes the base solid."

The quarry was rediscovered in the early 1990s by the Stockers, who had purchased the property in 1985. Damage from a ravaging thunderstorm had exposed the ledge, with old tools left behind.

Bill and his brother were restoring old houses in a historically correct manner. At one point, he needed granite pillars for a project and realized he could get granite from his own quarry. He opened the yard part time in the early 1990s and it became a full-time operation in early 2000s.

"We split the old-fashioned way like it was done 200 years ago, using feathers and wedges," Bill said. "Landscaping with stone has really taken off in the last 20 to 30 years."

Their handcrafted granite products are displayed in the

quarry yard and the family is eager to talk.

"I love working with stone and it lasts forever," he said.

In Sunapee, the granite artistry is featured in the benches at the harbor, Knowlton House steps, around town and lake as well as many other local areas. The Stockers also produce headstones, birdbaths, pavers (steps), fire pits, cemetery markers and more.

Pam had left her 20-year position at Sunapee Middle-High School as a special-ed paraprofessional in 2011. A short time later she was diagnosed with breast cancer. Somewhere along the way, inspiration shifted the perspective of that challenging time for Pam. She decided to create an ornament.

It was named "Sunapee Circles of Hope" conveying the message of hope, courage and optimism.

"Something resonated with people and they were wearing them as necklaces," Pam said. "Then pendants came."

Every year a new ornament is released with a description card included. The 2013 Sunapee Snowflake is one of the top-selling ornaments.

The first bead was created in January of 2012 after Pam got the idea to make a bead from the cutouts of the Sunapee Circles of Hope. The American Bead Collection was born, which includes the beads of American people, North American Collection, Americana and Global.

"Our mission is to affect people in a meaningful way," said Pam.

The idea was to release a bead for all 50 states and specifying beads for representation of groups of Americans; such as veterans, survivors, heavenly souls and volunteers of America.

"The whole premise of the American Bead Collection is to represent the bedrock of all 50 states," Pam said.

The Stockers are about half-way there.

Granite, jasper, agate, rhodonite, amazonite and New Hampshire scorzalite (rare and

prize of their collection) are just a few examples of bead materials. Pam does most of the jewelry making.

"The material has to be hard enough, no fractures or rough rock and the bead size depends upon how you cut the slab," Pam said. "Rocks are tested to make sure they are competent and it takes good polishing."

Bill builds his own wheels and some tools are made inhouse.

"Part of the fulfillment is opening a rock, which is like opening a Christmas present," said Bill. "My view as an artist is determining what I can do with it to make it interesting."


"There is a satisfaction in creating something from nothing," he added.

Someone may come in the shop with a particular rock or item, hoping something can be created with what is special to them.

"It means something to know when people are touched by what I make and everything has a story," Bill said.

People have a hard time believing what they make from scratch, from the ground to something that may be on the dining room table.

Bill's ingenuity leads to new roads of exploration. He fashions electrical insulators, plumbing pipes and fixtures for a variety of pieces in steampunk style.

The results of both Brandon and Brad's respective talents and meticulousness are evident in their work.

"What we make will last a lifetime," said Brad. "It is gratifying to make something with your own hands and it came from here."

Brandon feels very fortunate with his work and being able to be with family.

"This is a dying art in a way, and I enjoy being in this niche," he said.

All three of Bill and Pam's daughters-in-law also have a part in creating an ornament.

The Stockers feel that it isn't just their story but strive to honor what is important to customers.

"It might be a monument to memorialize a loved one, beads from their home state, school they attended, a survivor bead to perhaps the handcrafted gift we created," said Pam. The Stockers exhibit at expos, trunk, retail, wholesale and flower shows. They are long-standing members of New Hampshire Made.

"You have to take the product to the people now and then," Bill said. "People who have seen us at shows come visit our shop."

After Pam's diagnosis, many people came to Bill with concern, sharing their own stories. He was moved by their caring, also expressing empathy to others. He was compelled to do something symbolic.

Bill constructed a huge obelisk, which rises majestically in the quarry yard. It has 103 (for Route 103B) lines etched outward in the granite. He named it "Rays of Hope" offering an encouraging message to friends, family and extending to all people.

The shop is handicap accessible. It is open Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.
