Inn at Pleasant Lake, a home away from home without the chaos of modern existence

NEW LONDON – Inn at Pleasant Lake owners, Scott and Jennifer Reed, are celebrating the establishment's rich 150-year history and guests with events and festivities all year long.

The tradition of reliable, quality hospitality has endured and kept guests returning to the inn and the Reeds are continuing that legacy with their own style. Former guests or employees from even 20 or 50 years ago stop in to visit. They share fond memories with the Reeds of summer vacations, weddings, employment, whatever the occasion was. Some come bearing photos.

"Thank you for another awesome stay, 18 years and counting," was one comment in the guestbook from 2017.

The Reeds purchased the property in 2015 and invested a substantial amount of time preparing to become innkeepers with an onsite restaurant. Months of research on successful inns, in addition to actually working at the inn for a time gave the Reeds sharp insight into what life would be like as innkeepers.

Neither one had any experience in the hospitality industry. They studied trends, digital marketing and website presence. Time was also spent on learning about the restaurant part of the business.

"The learning never ends, and we are still learning after three years," said Jennifer. "We expect to keep learning."

Both are Massachusetts natives; Scott from Wareham and Jennifer from Worcester. Jennifer was a stayat-home-mom, raising their two children, Willie and Abbie, while living in Connecticut. Scott was a chief information officer who managed computers for several insurance companies. Their son sometimes plays piano in the restaurant.

The Reeds were looking for a retirement home, but Jennifer wanted the ocean and Scott wanted the mountains. They compromised by choosing Lake Sunapee for their home. (They do not live at the inn.)

"We had stayed at the inn while living in Houston at the time and we were tired of the corporate world," said Jennifer. "We were always interested in the inn anyway."

The business did not close or skip a beat as the Reeds transitioned into their new life as innkeepers and restaurant owners.

"The scariest part was it involved so many details. A successful restaurant is not easy and it adds an element of complications beyond the inn part of it," Jennifer said.

Her husband is occupied with every aspect of the business. "I love it," said Scott. "It is totally different and my fifth re-invention of careers."

He said it is fun having guests. "They expect to be happy and it is up to us to fulfill that promise."

The original portion of the inn was built in 1790 by Caleb Segur as a private a Cape-style farmhouse, with 400-plus acres of farmlands. It comprises only a small part of the inn. Retired Union officer, Colonel William Messer, later purchased the home. Most of the building, upstairs and downstairs, was added on in the 1860s. The second story was designed with a row of deep gables and Messer named it The Red Gables Inn. The Red Room is part of the original home, an essence of another era, with its rustic charm and seasoned hand-hewn beams.

The barn, circa 1789, had its foundation replaced by the previous owner. The rocks on which the barn was supported, were re-purposed for a stone wall around the flower garden which now contains plants that would have been around 150 years ago. Many events are held in the barn.

An excerpt from the inn's 26th season on the website says: "This modern house with its location and high elevation cannot be excelled in New Hampshire. The house is supplied with water from a never-failing spring. The grounds have an abundance of shade and are fitted for croquet, tennis, etc. The table is supplied with vegetables, milk, fresh eggs and butter from the farm and every effort is made to please the guests."

The cost for a top cut sirloin dinner at the time was \$7.50 and baby scallops sautéed with garlic butter were \$6.90. The price range to board for a week ran from \$6 to \$10, according to the location of rooms and transient guests paid \$1.50 a day. There was no reduction for children.

Parties from Boston would leave North Union Station for Potter Place in Andover and guests were met at the station upon notification either by letter or by wire.

Another piece from the website reads: "Red Gables is connected by telephone with New London long distance exchange, which in turn reaches every corner of the country."

Perhaps in that time it was the technology triumph and in today's world guest have the benefit of high speed internet with fiber optic.

The Reeds haven't unearthed how many owners the inn has seen. Older records require extensive digging. There have been at least six families since the Messers. Slope'n'Shore, the homeowners' association, ran it as a clubhouse/inn in the 1960s under the name White Gables. A subsequent owner named it Blossoms and in the 1970s-'80s it was Pleasant Lake Inn. It became Inn at Pleasant Lake in 1993.

A great-great granddaughter of William Messer, who is now 90, visited the inn a short time ago. She

had never stepped inside before, despite living across Pleasant Lake. Her grandmother had helped operate the inn at one time.

The restaurant, Oak & Grain, is open year-round and welcomes the public. The Reeds chose a separate name for the restaurant to distinguish it from the inn. Jennifer mentioned some local folks think the restaurant is only for inn guests.


Inviting aromas waft from the kitchen with chef Bryan Leary stirring pots and mixing it up with culinary ingenuity. Careful thought goes into choosing ingredients. He believes every time you eat should be a celebration of food.

"I really like being off the beaten path here and being surrounded by people who are interested in food, art and community." said Leary, who came from the city in 2016.

The menu changes every day. Leary does not do signature dishes but prefers to always do something new. The selections for each meal are chosen to complement each other.

The food is locally sourced from New Hampshire and Vermont, with 60 farms, including three community source fisheries, which are sustainably caught. There are fruit trees on the property as well as vegetable and herb gardens.

"A party has a table for the night, so they don't feel rushed," said Jennifer. "Dinner is meant to be relaxing."

Leary makes a presentation in the living room in front of the fireplace, describing all aspects of the food for the evening. One could envision a scene from yesteryear, with ladies chatting after dinner while the men stood by that fireplace discussing politics.

"We use a minimum of silverware," Jennifer said. "We don't have such a formal setting where people have to figure out what to use."

People stay year-round and those who come in the winter do so for a variety of reasons, but mainly for a quick getaway. They cater to skiers and there is no lack of winter activities in the area.

Many a couple has taken their wedding vows in the pergola. The event coordinator will arrange for flowers, boutonnieres, cake, bridal bouquet and the officiate according to what the couple would like. For the larger weddings, all details are chosen by the couple. The inn can accommodate up to 200 guests.

Another comment from the guest book: "Fantastic, romantic. One night stay for our 20th wedding anniversary, loved it."

Bridal showers, rehearsal dinners, farewell brunches, birthdays, anniversaries and corporate events are also held at the inn. Business people will stay for a retreat where they can get work done without the distractions of the office.

"People stay here over other inns because of the food and the artistry of our chef," said Jennifer. "We look forward to seeing regular guests."

Employees include a front desk staff, housekeepers, guest services, breakfast cook and an extra cook for the summer.

"This is a really good place to work and it's like family," said Anna Wickstrom, who serves in many capacities. "There is confidence behind the work and we are all proud to do it."

A narrow, steep staircase leads upstairs to the guest rooms, which are fresh and sedate. An eclectic mix of antiques and modern décor define the room.

"We keep updating and do a room a year," said Jennifer.

There are five junior suites and five standard rooms and all but one do not have televisions. There is one, however, in the common room. Seven rooms have a lake view.


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




Hike, bike 🏠 and paddle!

Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway is a 75-mile hiking trail linking the summits of Sunapee, Ragged and Kearsarge mountains and maintained by the SRKG Coalition. Maps and more can be found at www.srkg.com. SRKG members lead a number of hikes throughout the summer; check the calendar.

Take the Summit Trail to the top of Mt. Sunapee in Newbury. From the summit, you can either hike down the mountain or hike over to Lake Solitude on the backside of the mountain. There's also the Andrew Brook Trail (great for families) off Mountain Road which also will take you to Lake Solitude. Info: www.mountsunapee.com.

Mt. Kearsarge can be hiked from two sides. Rollins State Park in Warner has a nice family hike up the mountain. The Wilmot side is a more challenging hike from Winslow State Park.

For suggestions and trail maps, also visit the New London, Newbury or Sunapee information booths. Town halls are also a good source for maps and information compiled by the town's conservation commission.

Pillsbury State Park in Washington, off Rte. 31, is crossed by a network or hiking and mountain bike trails. These trails offer easy to moderate hiking in fairly remote settings. The park is an important link in the Monadnock-Sunapee Greenway, a 51-mile trail connecting Mt. Monadnock with Mt. Sunapee in the north.

Many towns and areas are getting involved in the Rails to Trails movement which turns the old railroad lines into well-maintained four season recreational trails. These trails provide wonderful easy hiking and biking allowing anyone the opportunity to enjoy the scenic views and experience the natural beauty of the areas.

One such trail is the 58-mile Northern Recreation Rail Trail which runs from the Concord city line to Lebanon. There are many parking areas and trailheads along the route. Kearsarge-Sunapee area visitors can park at Potter Place at the intersection of Rtes. 4 and 11 in Andover or at the Highland Lake Inn trailhead in East Andover. The Danbury General Store also has trail access along with parking, bathrooms and food. For more information and to find maps, check www.nhstateparks.org and look under the bureau of trails for more information or visit www.fnrt.org.

Another rails-to-trail section is at Bagley Field in Warner. This rail line originally connected Concord to Claremont. Other towns along this route are working on completing their own sections to bring visitors through the Sunapee area.

The Blackwater River in Andover is highly recommended for kayaking. If you like loons try Little Lake Sunapee and explore around Colby Point. Kezar Lake is another good bet for canoeing or kayaking. Your boat can be put in at the boat ramp next to Smiley Grove in North Sutton village. You can also take the 3-mile walk around the lake. If you're lucky, you can spot the nesting eagle. Lake Massasecum in Bradford has a public boat ramp off Rte. 114 with limited parking.


